<u>Temporary traffic management for traffic signal upgrade & construction</u> of shared use path – A140 Holt Road, Norwich

On Monday 16 June 2025 the first phase of work will begin on a project to extend The Yellow Pedalway route along the A140 Holt Road between Middletons Lane and the Broadland Northway.

The first phase will focus on the area around the Middletons Lane/ Amsterdam Way junction to upgrade the traffic signals and improve the existing footways in the area for those walking, wheeling (using wheelchairs or pushchairs) and cycling.

Works will include, installation of a new signal-controlled pedestrian and cycle crossing on Middletons Lane, upgrading and widening of the traffic signals and islands. The footways around the junction and outside residential properties will be widened and resurfaced, to create a shared use path.

The first phase of the project is due for completion by mid November 2025.

Remaining works outside residential properties will be completed in early 2026, with a further phase of work to link the upgraded route to the Broadland Northway to be programmed later next year. Further details on the subsequent phases will be provided in due course.

To safely complete the first phase traffic management will be required around the junction. This will be set up overnight on Sunday 15 June 2025.

Temporary traffic management

From Sunday 15 June 2025 until mid-November 2025:

- Temporary traffic signals will be in operation on the A140 Holt Road, Middletons Lane and Amsterdam Way junction.
- The temporary lights will be manually controlled 7am 7pm to aid traffic flow.
- An enforceable temporary 30mph speed limit will be in operation through the area.

During October 2025, full overnight closures of the A140 Holt Road, Middletons Lane and Amsterdam Way will be required for surfacing to be carried out. Further details on this will be provided nearer the time but access for residents, businesses and emergency vehicles will be maintained throughout.

Bus services

All bus services (including park and ride) will remain in operation whilst work takes place but may be subject to delays so passengers are advised to check with bus operators for any timetable alterations.

The work will cost around £2.2m to deliver this and subsequent phases and will be carried out by Norfolk County Council's infrastructure team and their contractors. This project is funded by The Greater Norwich Growth Board through the Infrastructure Investment Fund and money awarded to the County Council by the central government's Department for Transport (DfT).

The County Council thanks people for their patience while these improvements take place. We understand any disruption on the roads is frustrating and will be working with our contractor, Tarmac, throughout to minimise this as much as possible.
